## ...but it doesn't stay at home Seeing to the **Future** of CID Missions

Your Christian stewardship forms part of your life of vocation as a follower of Christ. In fact, it is a piece of an even larger story.

In 2019, the Central Illinois District's Stewardship and Mission education initiative was called "Bring Giving Home." Yet giving, once brought home, does not remain "at home" — right in one's own congregation. Part of it goes to support the Lord's work elsewhere.

We give through the Synod and District. For example, here in central Illinois there are long-standing special missions, among them outreach in Spanish, deaf ministry, and campus ministry.

- Ministry in Spanish reaches Spanish speakers with the Gospel in their own language. They need not become fluent in English to hear the Good News about Jesus.
- Deaf ministry is similar. By far, most deaf people are non-churched. Proclaiming the Gospel in sign language is key to reaching them for Christ and keeping them in the faith by the power of God's Word.
- **Campus ministry** brings the guidance and blessing of God's Word to young people at a vital stage of life that is fraught with temptations. If we are concerned about our kids and others possibly losing their faith at college, let's be concerned about campus ministry.

In large part to see to the continuance of these ministries, CID's Board of Directors has authorized a study to look into the feasibility of a major District-wide funding campaign. Such a campaign will likely be proposed to this summer's CID convention. Through the campaign, giving brought home will not all be staying at home.

## **Entrusted**

"a steward is one who manages the belongings of others in accordance with the will of the owner."

In his 2017 Bible Study *Stewardship Basics*<sup>1</sup>, Rev. Dr. Nathan Meador drives home the constant refrain — "a steward is one who manages the belongings of others in accordance with the will of the owner." In other word, a steward is one who is entrusted with the care of things. We often think of these things in terms of financial considerations — banks, financial advisors, treasurers... even individual members as contributors to their local congregations.

But stewardship is much broader that mere financial considerations. God has entrusted us with our very lives, and we steward that gift as we eat, exercise, visit doctors, and otherwise care for our bodies. This gift also extends to our care for neighbors as we "help and support him in every physical need" (*Small Catechism*, Explanation of the 5th Commandment) through various acts of kindness, as well as speaking out in the public square on behalf of the welfare of our neighbors. This stewardship includes even the very Good News of God's grace that is ours in Christ Jesus so that we have eternal life. The theme of our 2025 District Convention — "Witnessing Christ to the People" — drives home that we have been entrusted with this precious gift for the sake of sharing it with others.

As you take stock of your own place in life, the vocations to which God has called you and the tasks He has set before you, how has He entrusted you with the many and varied gifts — 1st Article gifts of creation, 2nd Article gifts of grace and salvation, 3rd Article gifts of holiness of life — how has He entrusted you with these gifts and how are you stewarding them according to His will?

## Seeing to the Future of CID Missions

The 2019 Bring Giving Home workshops likened the world's story to a play written in several acts. Act I begins with Creation, yet it also includes the Fall... and the first promise of the Deliverer. The rest of the Old Testament, with its many accounts of God's faithfulness despite human sin, fills out Act II. Act III is the New Testament era of the first century. The Messiah appears, the Lamb of God to take away the sin of the world. He lives, dies, and rises, then the Good News of His victory goes out into all the world through the church. The concluding Act V will take place when our Lord comes again to judge the living and the dead and take His people to Himself.

For almost 2000 years, the world has been in Act IV, the act that includes our lives. Suppose someone discovered a hitherto-unknown play by Shakespeare in a copy almost complete, except that Act IV is missing. Could an Act IV be written so the play could be performed? Yes, Act IV could be filled in since from Acts I, II, and III the characters and setting would be established, as well as the major conflict and the turning point of the action. In addition, Act V would be there to show how everything is to end up. With all this, an Act IV could be worked out on the spot, as it were.

We are in effect still working out Act IV in the great — and real! — daily drama of God's creation today. All people are involved, but we Christians know Whose we are, where we came from, why we are here, Who died and rose to save us, and that He will come again at the end for our final deliverance. We can therefore "improvise." With God's commandments and promises, we can live lives of service to Him and our neighbors. His Word does not provide us detailed instructions for every circumstance in life. We have the overall gist, though, so we can act in faith toward Him and love toward Him and our neighbors.

Our living out of "Act IV" embraces our vocations and our stewardship. Recognizing this helps bring giving home. The Lord brings giving home to individual church members, as churches teach people biblical giving, ask them to respond, and plan to live with the gifts the Lord gives through them.

He also brings giving home to entire congregations. Churches receiving gifts, including monetary gifts, in turn become givers. They allocate gifts for ministry, also beyond the work in their own midst.

The Lord has not made detailed stipulations for His church in this regard. He provides us the freedom to live out "Act IV" as together we seek to do what He said: proclaim the Good News to all.

## What's a lay person to do?


Once in a conversation with District President Mohr, I commented that serving as District Life Coordinator was akin to playing a twisted game of Whack-A-Mole. Of course, the preeminent issue is always Abortion. But when you try to focus on that matter, another issue pops up in the news or in pending legislation — like Physician Assisted Suicide or Transgenderism. Or perhaps it is concern about Drug Abuse or Pornography or Homosexuality or Gambling or Homelessness or one of many other various Life Issues that deserve our attention. All of these matters have the potential to damage or destroy human bodies or eternal souls. So what is a Christian to do?

To make the situation even worse, our culture is heavily influenced by evil. The Devil is relentless in trying to frustrate Christians, coaxing them to give up their testimony for Christ in the face of fear and darkness. Frequently he whispers in our ear (and sometimes he shouts directly into our face), "Mind your own business! Who do you think you are to judge the sins of others? The situation is hopeless — what can you do anyway? Let the clergy handle it — it's their job after all." So what should an ordinary believer do against such overwhelming forces of evil?

Thankfully Jesus gives us the answer. And the answer is so beautiful and eloquent in its simplicity. He instructs us to humbly love our God, and then to love our neighbor in genuine compassion. That's it! We please our heavenly Father through the expression of our love.

Martin Luther understood the anxiety that lay people carry when it comes to our own individual duty to God. He framed the solution in the context of Vocation. Whatever station we have in life, it is given to us by God himself. We are to accept our position in this world


as a gift. And then we are to honor Him in everything we do and say. You may never know how the power of the Holy Spirit is manifest through the tiniest act of kindness



The Lord wants us to stand up for the convictions of our faith. Let the hope in your heart be evident to all. Be aware of the spiritual realm and know that human actions on earth can have eternal implications. Avoid sin, because that grieves the Holy Spirit and hinders our testimony of Christ.

## A Dollar for Missions News

## First Project of 2025

Rev. Erich Heintzen, Jr. was CID's first full-time campus pastor. When he began serving students at the University of Illinois in the fall of 1941, he soon came face-to-face with a major obstacle: location, location, location. Trying to serve university students from St. John Lutheran Church in Champaign set the work at a decided disadvantage. The church proved "too distant from the center of our student population to serve the needs of our work adequately," he reported. "What we need, and need badly," he concluded after his first semester, "is preaching on the campus. As long as we are bound by the prevailing restrictions, we are merely playing at student work."

Campus ministry was too important to play at, though. Students entered the University of Illinois in increasing numbers during World War II, mushrooming thereafter. The campus population continues to grow today. CID eventually built the present University Lutheran Church, which was dedicated on May 17, 1953.



That was more than 70 years ago.

The first Dollar for Missions project of 2025 is to help maintain this campus church for the proclamation of the Gospel into the future, for your children and grandchildren as well as their friends and neighbors in a diverse student body. It is a \$25,000 project for masonry repair and repointing at University Lutheran Church and Student Center in Champaign.

The building's entire facade is brick and concrete masonry, which requires periodic care to maintain the structure's integrity and waterproofing. Portions of the masonry need attention. Small sections of the brick are crumbling due to freeze/thaw cycles and sustained water exposure. There is some water infiltration between the masonry window frame and the sanctuary casement windows. In some spots, the mortar between bricks is cracking or crumbling away. DFM funds will be used for targeted masonry repairs and repointing, focused on the areas where most needed, as identified by a masonry contractor.

College is tough. Students need Jesus. We do not want to play around with the work of bringing Him to them in Word and Sacrament. Your extra dollar for missions each week will help to maintain University Lutheran Church as a place for God's grace.

## 2025 Minois Pro-Life March

## March 25th in Springfield

On March 25, 2025, concerned citizens from all over Illinois will gather in Springfield for the annual state Pro-Life March. Appropriately, March 25 is the festival of the Annunciation.

The Annunciation was when the angel Gabriel went to a young virgin named Mary and told her that she would be the mother of the Christ. Quite likely, Jesus was "conceived by the Holy Spirit" right at that time.

This event in Nazareth, not His subsequent birth at Bethlehem, was when the Word became flesh. The church has historically observed the event exactly nine months before Christmas, which of course we celebrate on December 25.

In biological terms familiar today, for us men and for our salvation God the Son became a Zygote, a Blastocyst, an Embryo, then a Fetus before He was born. Whatever technical word may be used at any stage of Mary's pregnancy, our Savior was throughout fully human even as He was fully divine. Even before His birth, He was Lord. Elizabeth affirmed this in Luke 1:43: "But how does this happen to me that the mother of my Lord comes to me?"

The festival of the Annunciation marks the beginning of Christ's Incarnation. It also provides a good reminder about the true beginnings of human life.

Annunciation Day will make a great occasion for the Pro-Life March.

Trinity Lutheran Church (220 S 2nd St, Springfield, IL, 62701), across the street from the state capitol building, will again conduct a Matins service on the day of the march at 11:00 a.m. Northern Illinois District President Allan Buss will preach.


Immediately thereafter, worshipers may walk to the ballroom of the State House Inn, one block north of the capitol building, to pick up a light lunch consisting of a four-inch ham or turkey sandwich, bag of chips, cookie, and bottle of water. Suggested donation is \$6.

The Pro-Life rally outside the capitol is scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m. Actual marching should step off at about 2:00 p.m.

Worshipers may park in the State House Inn's west parking lot at the corner of Adams and First Streets, across First Street from the hotel building. Watch for attendants in this lot wearing green LCMS Life Ministry vests. They will give you a parking pass to place in your vehicle.

By all means, please carpool. We want to minimize the number of vehicles needing parking downtown.

## **Deaf Ministry Update**

CID's District-wide Deaf Ministry parish (now called Central Illinois Lutheran Deaf Outreach) had the last two of its monthly workshops in a new location, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Sherman. Since the November departure of veteran missionary to the deaf Pastor Tom Phillips, it has proven helpful to consolidate operations of the parish in one location instead of the two (Jacksonville and Normal) at which Pastor Phillips had been serving. Good Shepherd, Sherman, has welcomed the parish to continue these workshops on the third Saturday of each month (at no cost to the parish or the District, by the way!) throughout 2025.



As vacancy pastor, Rev. John Reinke from St. Louis (pictured left) leads the monthly workshops, makes pastoral visitations to the ill and dying, and conducts multiple Zoom meetings each month. He is in the early stages of preparing two women from the parish for entry into a deaf ministry track for deaconess study at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

## **Mortgage Interest Rebates**

As God blesses the Central Illinois District Church Extension Fund (CID-CEF), so we return His blessings to those churches, organizations, and schools in the Central Illinois District that have borrowed funds in answer to God's calling to make disciples of all nations. Under the Mortgage Interest Rebate Program, the CID-CEF returns part of the interest paid during the year by our borrowers under our standard interest rate program, thereby reducing the cost of their loans and returning financial resources to them to meet other needs in their ministries.

This year, the CID-CEF Board of Trustees approved returning \$150,000 to our borrowers under this Mortgage Interest Rebate Program. All borrowers qualified to receive a rebate under our standard interest rate program met the qualifications to earn this rebate, which will return to them an estimated 24% of the interest they paid on their loans in 2024, effectively reducing their interest rate by 24%.

## cid welcomes sid to the 2025 Youth Bible Bowl

**TOPIC:** The Life of David (1 Samuel 16 – 1 Kings 2:12)

**DATE:** Sunday, April 6th

**PLACE:** to be determined — a centrally-located venue (usually a church, school, or

Camp CILCA, near Springfield) large enough for all the teams who register.

**AGES:** youth involved in their church's junior or senior

youth group, from grades 6-12, up to age 19.

The Bible Bowl provides an opportunity for our youth to be involved in Scripture study and thus to grow in their knowledge of God's Word and to grow in their faith. It allows youth to get together at the circuit and district levels for friendly competition concerning our common confession of the Christian faith. Up to two teams from each circuit (or other local Bible Bowl) are invited to participate at the District Bible Bowl. In order to get more youth participation, circuits are encouraged to hold Bible Bowls at least a week before the District Bible Bowl to determine which two teams advance to the more difficult questions at the District Bible Bowl.

The Bible Bowl encourages all our young people to study a different portion God's word together every year, and come together as a review for them (and the adults who teach them and encourage them at the Bible Bowl). Pastors and youth leaders teach, explain, review, and provide practice questions for their own youth about this year's portion of the Bible in whatever ways they see fit (except that questions from previous years or other districts should not be used). Questions can all be answered from the assigned biblical text, and will not delve into theological implications of the text, or expect knowledge of later biblical references to David (but we hope you will discuss some of this in your own groups, e.g. who is "the Son of David" in the N.T.).



# STUDYING THE Life of David SHOULD LEAD TO:



increased trust in our God, seeing how He chose, guided, and protected David,



increased understanding of God's law, seeing examples of the results of keeping or breaking God's law,



increased appreciation for the Gospel of Christ, seeing God's promise of David's greater Son, and His merciful forgiveness for repentant sinners.
